The FIRST Fords – Models A - F





Starting from 1903 with the Model A (shown above) founder Henry Ford and his team went through 19 letters of the alphabet before the Model T was introduced in 1908. Some of these cars were experimental or special models that never went into production. Ultimately 8 models reached production status before the Model T: the models A, B, C, F, K, N, R and S.

The 1903 Ford **Model A** aside from being the first Ford car produced was also profitable for the company. It was available as either a two or four seater and was produced in only the color red (notice how the second row of seats were added to the two seater, with a door allowing entrance from the rear). Ford Motor Company of course reintroduced the Model A in 1928 as a replacement for the highly successful Model T.

By the time the first Model A was unveiled Henry Ford's cash was dwindling fast. On July 15 of 1903 as luck would have it Henry Ford received cash for the full price of one vehicle and down payments for two others. That in itself was enough to keep the Ford Motor Company in business. Therefore, when you look at the 1903 Model A, it's significance cannot overstated. According to Ford Motor Company, a red 1903 Model A Rear Entry Tonneau is believed to be car number 3, chassis number 30, and the lone survivor of the group of Model A cars sold that particular July day in 1903. That particular historic car was purchased by Ford Chairman Bill Ford.

Although the Model A had somewhat of a horse buggy look to it, these horseless carriages could reach a speed of 28 MPH. Many early automakers came from the carriage building business thus the similarity.

The car came as a two-seater runabout for \$800 or the \$900 four-seater tonneau model with an option to add a top. The horizontal-mounted flat-2, situated amidships of the car, produced 8 hp. A planetary transmission was fitted with two forward speeds and reverse, a Ford signature later seen on the Ford Model T. The car weighed 1,240 lb (562 kg) and could reach a top speed of 28 mph (45 km/h). It had a 72-inch (1.8 m) wheelbase and sold for a base price of US \$750. Options included a rear tonneau with two seats and a rear door for \$100, a rubber roof for \$30 or a leather roof for \$50. Band brakes were used on the rear wheels.

The company had spent almost its entire \$28,000 initial investment funds (\$911,970 in 2022 dollars) with only \$223.65 left in its bank account when the first Model A was sold. The success of this car model generated a profit for the Ford Motor Company, Henry Ford's first successful business.

Ernest Pfennig, a Chicago dentist, became the first owner of a Model A on July 23, 1903; 1,750 cars were made in 1903 and 1904 at the Ford Mack Avenue Plant, a modest rented wood-frame building on Detroit's East Side, and Ford's first facility.

Although Ford advertised the Model A as the "most reliable machine in the world", it suffered from many problems common to vehicles of the era, including overheating and slipping transmission bands. The Model A was sold only in red by the factory, though some were later repainted in other colors. However, it was \$150 more than its most direct competitor, the Oldsmobile Curved Dash, so did not sell as well. The Model A was replaced by the Ford Model C during 1904 with some sales overlap.

In 1904 the **Model B** was introduced, a more luxurious touring car. Its styling and lay-out was more modern than that of the Model A, with the engine in front and a proper radiator. The 4-cylinder in-line engine produced 24 HP, three times more than the 2-cylinder Model A unit. This was in line with the price of the Model B: \$2000, almost three times as much as that of the Model A. The gas headlights were an extra. The last of the Models B was sold in 1906, and about 500 were produced in total.

The **Model C** of 1904 was an updated version of the Model A. It had a more modern look and a slightly larger engine than the Model A. The Models A and C were produced next to each other for a while, and Models A could be had with the engine of the Model C, making them Models AC. The model C engine, again a "flat" 2-cylinder unit, delivered 10 HP, and the wheelbase of the Model C was 6 inches/15 cm longer than that of the Model A. The "hood" in front was ornamental, the en-



gine remained beneath the front bench as in the Model A. The Model C sold for \$850 as a two-seater, the tonneau model was \$100 more expensive. Again, the extra rubber top requested an additional \$30 and the leather one \$50. From 1904 till 1905 approximately 800 Models C were made.

The first production model after the Model C was the **Model F**, although there was a delivery car based on the Model C that was designated **Model E** by some, but Ford catalogs simply describe it as "Delivery Car". The Model F was again a development of the original Model A and its younger Model C brother.

The Model F was larger and more luxurious than its predecessors, and had a four-seater phaeton body with running boards as standard. It came into life in 1905 and it was last sold in 1906 after about a 1000 were made.

In the Model F the flat twin engine was still located under the front seat, but the front sported an elaborate ornamental hood to make it look more modern. The wheelbase had grown by another 6 inches compared to the Model C, now totaling 84 inches/213 cm. This model sold for as much as \$1000, also a 25% increase to the original price of the two-seater Model A within two years. But this is not a fair comparison, since the Model F is much more car...



The Model F ended Ford's first model cycle that had started with the Models A with serial numbers from 1 to 870, followed by the Models AC and C with serial numbers from 670 to 2570 and concluded by the Models F commencing with serial number 2575; all these models were numbered more or less sequentially to each other.

Next month we will look at the early Fords, Models K – S.

This month we feature 'DEVILED SPROUTS' (Pam Gillet, from Wi Chapter, "A" Road to Good Cooking)

1 1/2 lb. Brussel sprouts 3/4 tsp. dry mustard 1/4 tsp. dried thyme

1 onion, minced 3 Tbsp. dry fine bread crumbs



Cook Brussel sprouts in boiling water until tender-crisp (5 - 7 minutes). Drain. Melt butter in skillet; add onion, mustard and thyme. Cook for 2 minutes. Add bread crumbs, salt and pepper to taste. Cook 1 more minute. Add this mixture to the drained Brussel sprouts.

Shake/stir to cover the sprouts with the seasoned mixture. Cook until desired doneness.

Through the generosity of Donna Lewis, former MAFCA President and MAFFI Trustee, "Betsy", a 1930 Ford Model A has been donated to help raise funds for the expansion of the beloved Model A Ford Museum. The car remains in the same condition as restored by Red Grow in the 1950's. Enjoy driving "Betsy", your newest Model A, to your next cruise-in or car show. This is a truly historical vehicle, once owned by a MAFFI Hall of Fame inductee.

"Betsy", became famous as the best Model A in the world. The Ford Model A has gathered 32 top place trophies in the 34 shows which the car was entered. That includes two national shows in 1957 and 1962. Overall, the car won 39 trophies. It is said that Red Grow's car, "Betsy", was an inspiration at the time. It drove many people to do their best in restoring their own car. This urge to do the best restoration possible, developed the need for more information about how to a better job. As a result, the Judging Standards evolved. We can thank Red Grow and the MAFCA founders for their vision.

In 1967, Red sold "Betsy" to a Ford car dealer named Dave Grubbs for \$5,000, an unheard-of price in those days. As a result, Dave Grubb placed the car in a glass cage centered in his dealer showroom. 





