The Harry Miller Event draws 1905 to 1963 race cars from all over the United Sates. "Harry Miller is quite simply the greatest creative figure in the history of American auto racing. He innovated the thoroughbred American racing engine design, which was followed faithfully by those who sought to outdo him. Miller was the first US designer who viewed the racing car as an art object. Miller had passion for metalwork and machinery that soared above and beyond other designers."

Harry Miller's cars and engines won the Indianapolis 500 39 times.

Most of the cars at the event will be driven on the track at various times throughout the day. Your ticket is a pit pass that allows you to see the cars close up and talk to the owners. There will be a few cars with Model T and Model A based engines. Great photo ops and the thrill of standing along the pit wall seeing and hearing race cars that are 60 to 110 years old as they speed past. The sound is unbelievable! Jim's technical tip by Jim Cannon, MAFCA Technical Director



I have been asked what adjustments should be made to the Model A when driving at high altitude, such as when going to the National Convention in Sparks/Reno at the end of June. Sparks is at about 4500 feet, which is not terribly high, but you my have to climb over some passes that are much higher in order to get there.

In general, the air is thinner as you go up in altitude. That means less oxygen is going into the engine when it runs, and the effective Air-Fuel-Ratio (or running fuel mixture) will get more rich as you go up. So you will want to adjust the GAV on the carburetor just a little bit LEANER (screwthe GAV in) as you climb to higher altitudes, to compensate for the thinner air. But not too much, especially when working to climb a grade. Retard the spark lever a bit, too, when climbing a steep grade.

If you don't make this small change, the mixture will be a bit rich and you run the risk of fouling your spark plugs. The engine may seem to run better on the rich mixture, but your fueleconomy will suffer and your plugs may foul.

'A' Trip Back to June 1982



Our historical article today takes us back to June of 1982. Where were you then? Bob and I were in our early 30's with two small children. That's about the time we decided to take them to Disney World, and I, as a stay-at-home mom, went back to work part-time. Routine and raising kids was the status quo. In researching world events, seems like the world was on a similar tread mill.

You sport fans may recall that Rickey Henderson was the fastest player ever to steal 50 bases by June first of that year. The 36th NBA championship was won by the LA Lakers who beat the Philadelphia 76ers 4 games to 2. And Pete Rose got his 3,772nd hit on June 22nd.

Seems President Ronald Reagan made a lot of news in June of 1982. He had meetings with Pope John Paul II at the Vatican and met with Queen Elizabeth the II as well. On June 17th he addressed the UN General Assembly and said, "We must serve mankind through genuine disarmament." And on June 21st John Hinckley was found not guilty by reason of insanity for his 1981 attempted assassination of the president. On June 15th the Supreme Court ruled that all children, regardless of citizenship, are entitled to a public education. World news included Argentina's surrender to Great Britain, ending the 74-day Falkland Island conflict on June 14th. Riots followed in the days after.

Remember E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial, starring Henry Thomas and Drew Barrymore, directed by Steven Spielberg? That film was released June 11th, 1982. Paul McCartney released "Take it Away." And for those of us who eat up the news on the Royal Family, Prince Charles and Princess Diana gave birth to Prince William on June 21st. A whole generation has gone by and now Prince William has three children of his own.

So what was on the docket for our "A" club. The big push leading up to the June 5th and 6th, was the Car Show and Swap Meet at the State Fair Race Track on June 5th and 6th. Mike Brojanac was the chairman of that big event. The event went from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Jerry Manning wrote in his Loose Lug Nut article, "How many cars, parked side by side, two rows opposite one another, will fit all the way around the race track at State Fair Park. We can't sleep without knowing that. So bring your car out and help solve the mystery."

The "A" Tech tip was on timing the ignition system. "The A system, like most of its other systems, is somewhat forgiving, and will run even when not timed perfectly. But to run properly, the spark must occur at the end of the compression stroke on top dead center. To find the compression stroke and time the spark, there were 12 instructions to follow." Call if you want more info!

Some "Did You Know?" facts: With the introduction of the Model A on December 2, 1927, over 10 million people came out to see the car during its first two days of showing. The 1931 commercial vehicles had 38 color options available. Gasoline gauges are built so that they register full "F" when the cork float just touches the top of the tank. With this setting, there will still be a reserve of approximately one gallon in the tank when the gauge registers "0".

One very interesting article was written by Gary Koser. Dennis and Marge Pierce, LeRoy and Judy Schettl, and Larry and Grace Koser flew to Australia for fellowship and fun at the Australia Model A Meet. This was a four-day event with car judging, BBQ, dancing, riverboat cruise, and an Awards Banquet.

I'll close with a springtime quote found in the newsletter.

People are like rainbows - each different in color, size and shape. People are like sunshine - they spread a bright light every time they smile or laugh and make the world a brighter place.

Looking back in the rearview mirror

Spring Tour 2018

The turnout was good for our first tour of 2018. The salt still on the roads meant most of us were in modern cars. There were 3 A's a '47 Ford convertible and a '35 Ford Tudor. Total attendance was over 34.

This year our tour focused on Milwaukee County and its neighborhoods. Our first stop was University School near River Hills. This school traces it's roots back to a German school in the heart of Milwaukee in the same area as MSOE. In fact, the building right next to the Grohman Museum housed the German school that preceded University School.

We continued through River Hills, a neighborhood for people who wanted an upgrade over living on Lake Shore Dr. Then we meandered through Kletsch Park, one of Milwaukee County's beautiful playgrounds designed to serve everyone. These parks distinguish Milwaukee from other cities in the US.

Continuing, we passed the very impressive Jewish Community and Education Centers in White Fish Bay. From this impressive size and architecture, we moved on to the bizarre. Mary Nohl spent a life time making

concrete statues, hundreds of them, in the yard of her lake front home in a style all her own and so distinctive it was designated a national treasure after her death.

Aprons make acceptable gifts!


Aprons have been around a long time but there are lots of choices today.

They appeared in Medieval and Renaissance paintings and mostly looked like they were rectangles of cloth. Today they are more of a fashion statement but just as utilitarian. In the past people did not have the luxury of a large wardrobe nor did they have the laundry facilities as we have today so aprons served the purpose of covering your dress to protect it from soiling. The apron could be washed every couple of days or more often whereas the dress under the apron maybe only was washed once a week.



Aprons followed the lines of the dress during the 1920's, long and no waistline. During later years, they were sometimes cinched at the waist.

Up until the 1940's large quantities of flour and chicken feed arrived in cotton sacks and were durable enough to withstand washings and rough handling. The sacks came in bright, colorful, floral patterns. If the apron had seen its better day, the best parts were cut out and used for quilts. No wasting in those days!

I always thought an apron was an apron but they had different names:

Full apron – covers the whole front

Half apron - tied at the waist, no bib

Princess apron – full apron with bib and skirt, cut in one piece and no waist seam. This style was very popular in the 1920's and 1930's.

Pinafore – bib style that covered the chest and fastened with a pin, thus the name

Pinny – British slang for pinafore or apron

Hostess – 50's term for a half apron, dainty fabric and made for show

Bib – top portion of apron that covers the chest and made from a simple square

Smock – more like a dress. Popular for painting and gardening

Cobbler - covers front and back, generally straight with ties or buttons at the sides

Chef's – one piece with straight 'skirt' and bib. Ties in the back

So when you need a gift, think of an apron. There are lots of patterns to choose from!
