Our Greater Milwaukee Area Winter Swap Meet will be held <u>Sunday, February 26, 2017</u>, at Washington County Fair Grounds in West Bend, Wisconsin. We will use the West Pavilion and East Expo Center where each aisle vending space will be approximately 11' X 9' and is \$35. Wall spaces may vary in size depending on location in either building and are \$40.


We have space available for car clubs to help promote their special interest to the public. Clubs may use these spaces to sell their club merchandise and/or hand out club literature, <u>spot not to be used for selling car parts.</u> Those spaces are \$26 and are approximately 3' X 11" and include one free table (no credit given if table not used) and admittance for two people.

- 1.) Returning vendors will have the option to occupy the same space(s) they did in 2016, however your payment and completed application <u>must be returned us by November 7, 2016</u> to insure your same space(s).
- 2.) After November 7, 2016 any available spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis. We will honor your space requests as best as we can, however, <u>WE DO RESERVE THE RIGHT TO ASSIGN VENDOR LOCATION. WE ALSO RESERVE THE RIGHT TO DECLINE TO SELL SPACES TO PAST "NO SHOW" VENDORS.</u>
- 3.) Maximum number of spaces for a vendor is limited to 6, to help ensure a more diverse selection of swap merchandise. Each space rental includes 2 free admission wrist bands.
- 4.) NEW this year...All vendors MUST WEAR WRIST BANDS TO GAIN ACCESS TO THE BUILDING. NO WRIST BAND, NO ADMITTANCE!!!!!
- 5.) NEW this year...Doors to public will NOT open until 8:00 a.m.
- 6.) Vendors MUST vacate building by 4:00 p.m.

All other spaces will be available until we are sold out.

Remember – many hands makes the work load light. Even **SOME** hands will help!



Sunshine Report: The Wisconsin Chapter extends its deepest sympathy to the family of club member Jan Erickson. Her family, as well as those who knew and loved her, will deeply feel her loss.

The history of service stations: The horseless carriage was introduced in this country in 1895 and by 1913 registration exceeded one million. Simultaneous with this growth the gasoline end of the petroleum industry came into prominence. The adequate supply of cheap gasoline made this growth possible. Therefore it is only natural that the idea for filling stations should have developed. Horses had stables; cars had filling stations.

The first filling station in the U.S. is credited to the Standard Oil Company in Seattle, Washington, in 1907. The gas dispenser consisted of a hot water boiler and a faucet at a bulk plant. At this time filling stations were merely convenient points for a motorist to fill up with gas and oil. Soon after, other services were added. First came free air and water. Only those who have used backbreaking hand pumps can appreciate what a convenience this was to the motorist. By 1921 improvements in auto engines and better highways brought extended trips. Service stations saw the need for restrooms and drinking fountains. By the late 1920's the responsibility for lubrication was in the hands of a person who understood the machinery. The serviceman also would wash windows while the car was filled up. By the late 1930s service stations routinely stocked tires, headlight bulbs and batteries. Today everything essential to the care of your car can be found at your neighborhood service station. (seems like we may have gone full circle – how many "full service" stations exist? We have now become gas stations with convenience stores – try to find an auto battery at your local Kwik Trip.) continued on next page

# Ray Salentine and the Packard Moving Van

The story starts back in the late 80's. I had just bought an Economy Power King tractor and it was out on my lawn one Sunday. A man drove in and asked me if I liked the machine. I said that I did. He was an older man and he had on a Power King jacket and matching cap. We talked about the tractor and I told him that I had an early Economy tractor from 1947. I took him inside my barn and showed it to him along with my old trucks and cars. Then he told me a story about a very old truck from his youth. I found out later that he was James Turner, the president and founder of Engineering Products Company, the makers of my Power King



founder of Engineering Products Company, the makers of my Power King Tractor.

It seems that his parents had a home on an island in the middle of Lake Nagawicka near Delafield. Sometime in 1921, they bought new furniture for the house. It had to be delivered when the lake was frozen. When the ice was thick enough, Coakley Brothers Movers brought the new furniture to the island in an old hard rubber Packard truck. After the pieces were delivered, when they went to drive the truck back across the lake, a rear wheel broke through the ice and the crew said they would be back in the morning with a team of horses to pull it out. The truck was left to idle all night rather than trying to start it on a cold morning.

The next day, when they came back, there was a hole in the ice and the truck was gone. The lake is about 35 feet deep where it went down and no attempt was made to retrieve it. It was a very old truck, a 1912 Packard and I am sure that the crew was looking forward to a new one with pneumatic tires that went faster than 12 miles per hour.

Fast forward to the 1950's and the story was still told in Waukesha County bars. Ray Salentine and his son, Jim, of Ray's Garage in Tess Corners, ran the garage, but they also had a towing and recovery service. Ray was an avid antique car collector. His beautifully restored 1911 Pope Hartford was a magnificent example of a brass era car. When he heard about a brass era Packard that was in the lake it caught his attention. Rumor has it that there may have been a wager of some sort involved.

Joe Higgins and the local skin diving club confirmed the existence of the truck by bringing up the radiator and some other small parts of it.

That was enough evidence to get Ray started trying to recover it from the lake. In September of 1959 the project got underway.

Jim Salentine tells me that a cable was attached to the frame by the divers. Cable gathered from all of the big wreckers was pulled out to the island by a boat. A cable block was anchored to the island and coupled to the cable on the Packard. All this took more than 1500 feet of 5/8" cable and a lot of hard work. The



first weekend was spent pulling the cable to the island. In the process, one of the cable clamps slipped and the two cable ends had to be retrieved from the lake bottom. Eventually the old truck was raised off of the bottom by filling the truck body with 55 gallon barrels along with four military surplus bridge pontoons. They pulled it to the island. While pulling it up onto the island, the rear wheels hit the beach and unbelievably, the engine turned over spewing water out of the spark plug holes. *Continued on next page*

The moving van had landed upright on the lake floor. Joe Higgins and his son Pat said that the hardest part of the underwater work was that the water was very cloudy from the silt on the bottom and that it was almost impossible to see anything while they were hooking the cable to the chassis. Pat said that the whole thing was really stinky.

The next weekend, the old truck was floated back to the mainland and towed to Ray's Garage in Tess Corners.

Ray won the bet and of course he and Jim had some very juicy bragging rights.

A few years after I heard the Turner half of the story, I was visiting ATHS member Don Mericle's house. He took me on a tour of his collection of unusual antique trucks. I knew without being told what the half rusted moving van was that leaned against his barn wall. He had purchased the old truck from Ray Salentine. Don has since passed away and the truck passed through several owners.

About four years ago, Steve Kirsten bought the disassembled wreckage and started a restoration project. As of now, the chassis is about 50% finished. The engine is at a restoration shop in Bangor Maine. Steve has spent considerable money having patterns and then castings made of rusted and missing pieces. The en-

gine, transmission and steering gearbox were in remarkably good condition., considering.




