## New Berlin Historical Tour October 15, 2017

Join Linda and Dave Huenink on a tour of the historical buildings at the New Berlin Historical Park at 197<sup>th</sup> and National Avenue (Hwy ES). This area is known as Prospect Hill. There will be a guided tour and you will have a terrific panoramic view of the surrounding area. There is also a lookout tower which will give us a breathtaking look of the area. You will also be able to walk across the street to the oldest active orchard in Waukesha County – Weston's Antique Apple Orchard. It was established in 1935 with some of the apple trees dating back to the 19<sup>th</sup> century. There are several species of apple unique to this orchard which covers 16 acres and has over 700 trees.

From the orchard, we will head west for a tour of the county side, around Vernon Marsh and end up at Pieper's Porch Winery for a taste of some vino. We will also have a terrific view of the Vernon Marsh. Vernon Wildlife Area consists of 4,655 acres of wetlands, flowages grass land and woodlands. It is the home for migrating and nesting waterfowl, pheasant, small game, turkey and deer.





## 'A' Trip Back to 1964



Some of the events for 1964:

Feb — Our best attended meet. There were 59 adults and 32 children. They drank a quarter barrel of beer plus a case of shorties and four cases of soda, 24 bottles to a case. We had a film on the anniversary of the motor car and a film on the 1963 Indianapolis 500.

The February dance started out slow, with what looked to be a poor turn-out but by 9:15 people were pouring into the hall as if it was an air raid shelter and the Russians were bombing us. There were 174 paid admissions giving us a total of \$259. Our expenses included 5 half barrels of beer (approx.. 1,200 glasses), 1 case of soda, the band, 1 bartender and the hall rental. We ended the night with a \$90 profit.

May – Economy Run – twelve 'A's participated. First place went to Demo Staver, averaging 25 miles per gallon. Second place went to Larry Koser who averaged 23 miles per gallon and third place went to Wally Klager, averaging a shade under 23 miles per gallon. Afterwards we had a wiener roast and gabfest held at Alan and Carol Egelseer's home.

June 6<sup>th</sup> saw fourteen Model 'A's from our club participate in the annual Antique Automobile Club of America meet held at Mayfair shopping center. A very nice lunch was served free to those who registered and their guests.

July 12 – Hill Climb, organized by Ron Hegy, drew 17 Model 'A's and a '46 Chevy. The meet site was in the Holy Hill area. Once there members were assigned numbers to attach to the cars so we could begin timing their climb up the hill. The hill was quite formidable, about two blocks long. Bud Maramonte and his '29 pickup made the climb in 26 seconds. Bill Gunderson was second, a shade over 26. Third was Art Sternhagen with a time of 29.5 seconds (Art had a '32 v-8). Afterwards we met at Ron Hegy's house for brats and hot dogs.

July 26 – Our club participated in the annual Dousman Derby Days parade. Our cars were judged as a group and we won a third place ribbon and a check for \$4.00.

Aug 2 – Annual club picnic was held at Kettle Moraine Lake. Free beer, soda and ice cream. Games and prizes for the kids and adults. We enjoyed a feast of grilled brats, and hot dogs as well as other picnic goodies. The kids swam and played games while the adults mostly talked. Six plus cases of beer were consumed and a like amount of soda as well as 10 gallons of ice cream. The picnic cost the club \$50.

Oct 25 - For the first time in club history, we sponsored a swap meet. Attendance was much lighter than expected. This was probably due to the Packers playing that same day in Milwaukee. Many bargains were available and as one vendor said, "it's a buyer's market".

We now have 70 members on our roster. Now if we could only get 20% of that number to volunteer!


