



Start your tour at the 1852 William Donaldson log/frame Visitor Center... Browse through the Museum Shop filled with collectibles of days gone by.

Walk through the rooms of the Stagecoach Inn furnished with Wisconsin artifacts... Share the experiences of the Browns and the weary travelers who stopped at the Inn during their long horse drawn journey between Milwaukee and Watertown.

...Stroll the grounds and see the 1852 Log House Visitor Center, the Smoke House, the Ice House, and the Wagon/Blacksmith Shop... Recall school days past with the original 1862 Woodside School Bell Tower.

Costumed docents lead tours of the home and tell stories about families who lived there. Other features include a special exhibit; carriages and tools in the blacksmith house; a log home once located at Barker and North Avenues; an ice house, smoke house, and school bell from Woodland school.

## From the Oval Office.....The Presidents notes for June 08

One of the best things about our club is the opportunity to learn new things about the world beyond our Model A's.

On our May tour, led by Betsy and Gene Taurman, club members traveled to the Venerable Fire Collection Museum near Slinger, a museum full of firefighting equipment from the 1800s through the middle of the 20th century.



Looking over numerous horse-drawn (and some man-drawn) pumpers, and the massive gasoline - and diesel-powered trucks from the early years of the 20th century, was just amazing. No wonder so many of us wanted to be firemen when we were youngsters.

Club members also learned how fires were called into stations during the decades before telephones and other modern communication devices were commonplace. The museum guides gave us a live demonstration of the electro-mechanical process that occurs when an alarm on a sidewalk call box is pulled. We learned how the firefighters know, through a device similar to a ticker tape, where the fire actually is, and that, whether horse-drawn or motorized, firefighting equipment is out the door 90 seconds after the alarm sounds. (We were curious about the horses, and were shown a horse collar hanging from the ceiling that is lowered onto the animal and fully fastened with just two straps). Very interesting!

A month earlier, during the April spring start-up tour led by Sandi and Bob Davisson, we learned all about coffee during a visit to Beres Brothers roasters in Watertown. We were shown the equipment, learned how it worked, and we also learned about coffee trees, their life cycles, where they are grown, how the beans are picked, and how the beans make their way to the United States. For decaf drinkers, we also learned that there are two ways to decaffeinate beans, and that most of the decaf coffee we drink in the United States is decaffeinated in, of all places, Frankfort, Germany!

I suspect there will be plenty more to learn in the coming warm-weather months, since there are more than a dozen events listed in our Advanced Timing column still to come between now and the end of October (see page 2).

A few housekeeping notes.

We are still looking for a host for the Aug. 10 club picnic. If you're interested, contact a board member immediately. Also, our club can once again offer beer at the picnic and other activities (thanks to board member Dan Kane for getting our club insurance policy modified at a very minimal cost!)

FORTY-FIVE YEARS AGO, 1963 - The club dance was held at the hall at 1212 Clybourn St. The band was Dick Parks Trio. Only 14 members attended. This was poor attendance considering the club has over 50 members.

FORTY YEARS AGO, 1968 - Larry Koser arranged with the help of a friend to purchase a 1930 English Model A Town Sedan, complete with right-hand drive, sun roof, etc. It took many months to complete the deal and get it shipped to Milwaukee. Larry said the cost of the car isn't so bad, it's the extras, like sales tax, customs cost, ocean shipping and dock charges. It arrived with three pistons instead of four. Larry said it ran sort of rough.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO, 1993 - Model A's were displayed at the House and Garden Tour put on by the Historic Brewer Neighborhood Association.

TEN YEARS AGO, 1998 - The Eighth Annual Bowl Your "A" Off was held at Krueger's Lane in Menomonee Falls. Roger Olson presented club President Paul Piotrowski with a special prize for most gutter balls.

FIVE YEARS AGO, 2003 - The Veterans Hospital Car Show was attended by Tom Mosley, Bob and Barb Sonnen, Roger and Jan Olsen, and hosts Carl and Lu Doro.

## Venerable Fire Collection Inc. – May Tour

The May tour, to the Venerable Fire Collection Inc., was hailed as a good tour by all. There were 16 cars, but many of us were intimidated by the weatherman's forecast of a wet windy day, so only 4 Model A's showed up, the rest of us opted for water tight cars. As it turned out the weather was fine and the roads dry.

On the way we caught glimpses of shaggy haired blonde cattle, freshly shorn sheep and Texas long horns. The scenic drive was full of wild flowers, brilliantly green meadows, rivers and ponds all crying out summer is near. The grey of winter was giving way to the small green leaves peeking at us as we rode by. The roads through Kettle Moraine were hilly, curvy and fun with glimpses of the monastery perched atop Holy Hill.

The Venerable Fire Collection features all types of equipment from the late 1800's to 1970's including horse drawn steam pumpers, aerial rigs, pre-radio alarm and communication systems, and fire trucks in fine repair with shiny gold leaf and delicate pin striping. A popular feature was a 1912 film horse drawn rigs in action. Interestingly, it took 90 seconds from alarm to out the door, the same as today.

Keith Franz, founder and curator, built the huge barn with special stone floors to help control humidity and protect the beautifully restored equipment. The building is dust free and spotless. All this is located on his farm in Slinger and funded by donations. He began as a private collector in the 1960's and grew into the great nonprofit display we saw.—Gene & Betsy Taurman



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

Ford test-drives the Quadricycle

At approximately 1:30 a.m., Henry Ford test-drove his Quadricycle, the first automobile he ever designed or drove. Ford was working at the Edison Illuminating Company in Detroit at the time that he began building the Quadricycle. He had reportedly seen an article on the gasoline engine in American Machinist while in the company of friend and fellow engineer, Charles King. In King's recollection Ford claimed, "I want to build one of these." Ford employed the help of his friends in the Detroit engineering community to build an internal combustion engine on his kitchen table. It's important to note to what extent Ford was a visionary and an organizer. He was an engineer, of course, but he didn't by any means accomplish his engineering feats alone. Men like King, along with a whole slew of other engineers, volunteered their time to Ford's projects. King provided Ford with a whole crew of workers who worked in the makeshift machine shop Ford had constructed in his garage behind his Bagley Avenue residence in Detroit. Ford even convinced his neighbor, Felix Julian, to donate his half of the shed to the cause. King was building his own vehicle at the time, and actually preempted Ford in testing the horseless carriage in March of 1896. Ford followed King's carriage's test run on his bicycle. Ford did make one major innovation in building his first vehicle: he decided not to attach an engine to an existing carriage, but rather to construct a fourwheel body based on the principles of bicycle manufacturing. Ford completed his "Quadricycle" early in the morning on this day in 1896. He couldn't wait to test the invention. Only one of his associates, Jim Bishop, was present at the time of the vehicle's completion. In all of his enthusiasm in getting the car together, Ford failed to consider that his contraption was wider than the doors of the shed in which he built it. He and Bishop set upon the door and adjacent walls with axes in order to hack an entrance sufficient for the Quadricycle. The 500-pound, two-cylinder vehicle came to life in the alley behind Ford's house. Ford drove it down Bagley Avenue to Grand River Avenue, to Washington Boulevard, when the Quadricycle stopped. Bishop and Ford pushed the automobile to the Edison plant, where they replaced a nut and spring that had come loose. The next month, Henry drove his vehicle to his father's farm to show it off. His father apparently walked around it cautiously. Later he expressed his doubts to one of his neighbors: "John and William (Henry's brothers) are all right, but Henry worries me. He doesn't seem to settle down, and I don't know what's going to become of him." Maybe he'll become the most powerful citizen in the country!

The first gasoline tax levied by Congress was enacted as a part of the Revenue Act of 1932. The Act mandated a series of excise taxes on a wide variety of consumer goods. Congress placed a tax of 1¢ per gallon on gasoline and other motor fuel sold.

#### June 21, 1947

#### A Ford marries a Firestone

William Clay Ford married Martha Firestone, uniting two of the greatest fortunes in the American automotive industry. Henry Ford and Harvey Firestone had been close friends and allies during their lives after Firestone received the exclusive contract to supply tires for Ford's Model T. Neither man lived to see the union of their families.

#### June 7, 1954

#### Edsel design team goes to work

On this day in 1954, the Ford Motor Company formed a styling team to take on the project of designing an entirely new car that would later be named the Edsel. The decision came as Ford enjoyed its greatest historical success in the 1950s. The 1955 Thunderbird had outsold its Chevy counterpart, the Corvette, and the consumer demand for automobiles, in all price brackets, was steadily increasing. In exuberant Ford plants, signs that had once read "Beat Chevrolet" were changed to a more ambitious tune, "Beat GM (General Motors)." The Ford Motor Company consisted of four brand names: Ford, Mercury, Lincoln, and Continental, listed from lowest to highest in price range. Ford executives believed that there was a gap in the marketplace between the Mercury and the Lincoln, where a new car would compete against GM's Oldsmobile and Buick lines.

In the mid-1950s, Americans seemed to have an insatiable hunger for high horse-powered, heavily styled cars, with lots of chrome and many accessories. So Ford planned to fill the public's appetite with a suitable answer. The company spared no expense in the development of its new car, even going so far as to employ famous American poet Marianne Moore to supply possibilities for its name. After an extensive name search and no satisfactory result, somebody suggested that the car be named after Henry Ford II's father, Edsel. Ford balked at the suggestion initially and later relented, on the grounds that his father deserved a tribute; he urged the car's designers to live up to his father's name. Edsel had always had a knack for design, even if his business sense hadn't always lived up to his father's expectations. The Edsel project was launched with great fanfare and vigorous advertising. During the years between the car's conception and its production, the American economy took a downturn.

By the time the Edsel was released in 1957, the high end of the car market had once again contracted. Public reaction to the car's exaggerated styling was tepid at best, with particular objections aimed at the Edsel's awkward-looking "horse collar" grill. Sales for the car started slowly and foundered. Newly appointed company Vice President Robert McNamara was charged with the task of salvaging the operation. Had McNamara held the position years earlier, historians point out, the Edsel project may never have been taken on, as McNamara strongly believed Ford should concentrate on the economy car market. McNamara attempted to improve the car's construction and appearance, but when the attempt failed, he was forced to halt production of the car at a disastrous loss of \$250 million.

To this day, the Edsel remains the biggest failure in American car history, "a monumental disaster created for tomorrow's markets created by yesterday's statistical inputs." History has treated the Edsel more kindly, as its looks are now considered to be an attractive example of 1950s flair. Like its namesake, Edsel Ford, the Edsel has come to be known as an unfair victim of circumstance.


