


Martin is a CPA-Chairman at Jannsen and Company Jolene retired from Jannsen and Company in 1995.

Ever wonder what people talk about as they drive their Model A's? In June, my 14-year-old son and I were part of a long line of cars snaking down Highway 45 on a club tour to a car museum in Volo, III.
