

## Eagle River Weekend Get-A-Way

New Updated Info-Can't miss event!!

Thursday, July 30 - Monday, August 3, 2020

Tour Group from Milwaukee area will be led by Dennis and Anne Wacker Tour Hosts in Eagle River are Carl and Charlene Wussow

This is truly a "can't miss" event. The ride will be long but so worth it. We are leaving on Thursday and heading back Monday to avoid the heavier weekend traffic and to allow a more leisurely route.

We have 15 confirmed rooms held at the **Eagle River Inn**, Eagle River, Wisconsin. It is a beautiful setting on Watersmeet Lake where the Eagle River and the Wisconsin River join on their journey to the Mississippi River. The complex is located on Hwy.70 West, just about a mile from the City of Eagle River. The parking lot is secure and away from other locations that would have had lots of traffic. Breakfast is included. Some items include: hot waffles, breakfast sandwiches, hard boiled eggs, oatmeal, Danish, cereal, coffee and other items.

Room Rates on the parking lot side, 2 queen beds, fridge and micro is on special for us at \$107.10 and a lakeside room, with patio doors opening directly to the water complex are \$125.10. None of the other hotels have settings like this one and others are in more crowded areas with much more vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

Hotel registration can be made by each family by calling the **Eagle River Inn: 715-479-2000**. They will need to identify themselves as part of the group from the <u>Wisconsin Chapter, Model A Ford Club</u> to get those special rates. I suggest that you make initial contact with the Eagle River Inn not much later than January as summer reservations will be increasing after that time. Early is always better than late!

Details are still being finalized for the weekend, but so far we will plan a Friday late-morning Pirates Hideaway cruise (Pirate attire is encouraged) and a Fish fry at Chef Rene's award winning restaurant at the Eagle River Inn (all you can eat for \$14) and they have a bar lounge adjacent to the restaurant.

Saturday is our weekend headliner event - <u>Three Lakes Petroleum Museum Car Show</u>: Arrive by 9:00 a.m. or before. The show is from 10:00 a.m. to 200 p.m. with awards following. The museum is free and open all day. Food is available on the grounds and each car registered early will receive a coupon for 1 sandwich (hamburger, cheeseburger, bratwurst or hotdog, chips, soda and popcorn. Over 250 vehicles will be on display.

The Three Lakes Winery is only 2 miles away from the car show and the wine selection is outstanding along with a related "wine related" gift shop.

Saturday night event will be movie and pizza night. We will be showing Public Enemies. It was filmed at Little Bohemia just a few years ago and starred Johnny Depp. It is accurate, exciting and will be an opportunity to prime us for our dinner at Little Bohemia the following night.

Sunday the group will depart the hotel at 1:30 for a drive through the beautiful forests in the area. We will stop at the Dillinger Museum for a tour and then enjoy dinner at Little Bohemia at 5:00 p.m. Since it has never been restored after the FBI and Dillinger gun battle, our cars will be a highlight for photographs in front of the main building. We will return the hotel before dark.

#### Highlights from the Planning Meeting for the clubs to share with membership

- This year's Reunion dates are July 24th to 26th.
- Please pre-register, and save \$5. A pre-registration form is in this mailing and is on the web site at clubs.hemming.com/wirapidsmodela.
- This is still an affordable family event money raised from the auction and raffles offsets our costs.
- The 2019 Fund-raising auction made \$1314. Please help out by donating good usable items to this event. Doesn't need to be Model A stuff, but that is always appreciated. Don't forget about items for the kids.
- Each club needs to donate cash prizes for each raffle category: 2-\$35 for the Men's, 2-\$35 for the Women's, and 2-\$20 for the Kid's. Cash works better to help speed winner's prize selection. Individuals may also donate. The 2019 Raffle brought in \$540.
- The past Basket Raffle Chairperson has stepped down. In the 10 years of running this, Joey Burnett has raised over \$7700. This money all goes to offsetting the cost of our participation fees. Thanks Joey.
- Karry Kultgen will be running the Basket Raffle this year. Each club needs to donate a \$30 value Basket for this. The 2019 total was \$673. Clubs may donate more than one basket, and individuals may also donate. Baskets do not need to be elaborate. Look on Pinterest for some good ideas.
- You do not need to be a Model A Club member to participate in the Reunion, Model A is optional also.
- Rooms in the Rapids area go fast, reserve yours today.
- We ask that all participants wear their club's name tags, so that names can be learned. Name tags may be borrowed from Registration, please return afterward.
- Please list the first and last names of all participants that you are registering on the registration form. This is to help with the issuing of awards.
- All participants 16 years and older need to sign up for a job duty to help out over the weekend. If people don't start signing up, we will have to look into other ways of getting volunteers.
- Friday will be Era Fashion day, dress in Model A Era outfits for the day. This will be a great Photo-Op if there is good participation in this. This is not mandatory.
- Before the Dance on Saturday, Dick Ziegert will be playing songs on his accordion at the Clubhouse. This will run from 7:00 to 7:30.
- This Lady Drives a Model A is a course designed to show participants how to drive a Model A from someone other than a relative by birth or marriage. Schedule a time to do this.
- The corn roast will be on Friday, from 5:00-6:30, or until the supply runs out. \$1 an ear.

- New this year is a Pizza Roast, held at the same time as the Corn Roast on Friday night. Pizza will be sold at \$1/slice. Once the pizza is gone, it is gone.
- Shoe Box Swap Meet will be Saturday morning. Bring what fits in a shoe box, and swap/sell your items with other participants. Have your own change, as there will not be a banker on hand. All money raised is your own.
- The Ski Race will be Saturday morning, and is open to the "older children" of the Reunion. Definition of "older" and "children" to be determined by self. Form a 3-person team, sign up at the club house.
- Please remember to bring an item each day to the Pot Luck line in a disposable container for easier clean up, or put your name on dish if you want it back. All items brought to Pot Luck must be ready to serve, this includes slicing of any fruits and vegetables. The serving staff does not have the space or time to finish your dish.
- Kitchen duties have been assigned by club, and are listed elsewhere in these notes. Please be sure to help your club out on their day.
- Events Chaired by Clubs have also been assigned, and are also listed elsewhere. Some still need to be filled.
- With the exception of the Slow Drive and Chapter Team Events, each licensed/temps registered participant can go through the car games once. If the participant doesn't have a Model A, one may be borrowed.
- The Slow Drive will be on Saturday. A car and a participant may go through the Slow Drive only once.
- Guests cannot participate in Slow Drive or Chapter Team Events. They can do the other car games.
- Car games this year will be Bull's Eye, Center Bumper and Grenade Launch.
- Chapter Team Events will be May Pole, Bean Bag, and Teeter Totter. There'll be no practice round for these events, only a demo, so start practicing. Decide who will be doing these events for your club, so we do not need to be on the PA looking for them.
- The areas in, under and within 15 feet of any structure used by the Reunion, whether a building or tent, are now Smoke/Vaping Free. This includes the clubhouse, overhang and any Reunion tents.
- Electric Power will be ran out to the camping areas, with 10 amp service, and will add another \$15 to the camping charge. This is limited to the first 12 registered participants requesting it.
- Members of a participating club cannot register as a guest of a registered participant.
- Day Pass participants are not allowed to participate in Award Issuing Events, such as Hubley and Car Games.

## MAFCA Wisconsin Chapter General Meeting Minutes January 13, 2020

Board Members Present: Deb Lewis, Steve Lewis, Dave Huenink, Vicki Cooper, Jeana Angelini, Kate Rozman

The meeting was called to order at 1:32 p.m.

President – Deb - The Board received the newsletters from the reciprocating clubs. Dale Herrick, a new member, was introduced to the membership and motion was made by Dave Rozman and seconded by Steve Lewis to accept Dale him as a new member. The motion was put to a vote and it carried. The Board received an email regarding updating the clubs by-laws. A discussion was held regarding the changes and the proposed changes will be published in Wheeling the A and voted upon at a future meeting.

Vice President – Jeana. There we no new members other than Dale Herrick.

Secretary – Dave – A motion was made by Sue Quam and seconded by Linda Huenink to accept the December 8th, 2019 meeting minutes as written. The motion was put to a vote and it carried. 147 members have renewed their membership and 34 have not. In 2019, the club had 181 members. In December, a mass email and a letter was mailed to those who had not paid their club dues, indicating it was due by December 31, 2019.

Treasurer – Steve – A report of the revenue and expenses from last month was given. A motion was made by Sue Quam and seconded by Linda Huenink to accept the treasurer's report. The motion was put to a vote and it carried. There was no income or bills turned in.

Outdoor – Kate– Hosts are needed for the 2020 outdoor touring season. Several events already have hosts and Kate encouraged the membership to sign up for an event. Jan Olsen has information in Wheeling the A regarding the Memorial Day Overnighter. Mark Ackerman is doing the annual picnic at the same park in Sussex. Thus far 8 people have signed up for the Eagle River tour. A lot of events are planned in Eagle River and they are listed in Wheeling the A.

Indoor – Vicki – Hosts are needed for the 2020 /2021 indoor season. The Board is also looking for a new meeting place for the club's indoor meetings as our present location may not be available. A committee consisting of

Karen Schmeichen, Dave and Carol Rozman and Mike and Sandy Yokofich, was formed to look for a new location.



Swap meet report – 38 vendor spots remain unsold, and 190 spots have been sold. Dennis Cooper needs volunteers to help run the event. Fliers are available at this meeting for the membership to take and distribute. An advertising budget was created for the swap meet. The budget was designated to be twenty percent of the overall swap meet budget.

Sunshine- Linda – Cheryl Baewer had knee surgery in December and is doing good. Bob Davisson was at West Allis Memorial Hospital with pneumonia and heart problems, a club member reported he was at home and improving.

New Business – 2021 will be the clubs 65th anniversary. The membership was asked to think about ideas as to what the club would like to do to celebrate the this event. 




## FLOUR SACKS

In the 1920s and early 1930s, families were growing larger than ever as they spread out across the country; however, when the Depression hit, things like new clothes for their growing children became less important than food and shelter! In those days, flour and feed sacks were made of cotton, and when the manufacturers saw that women were using the cotton fabric to make dresses and other items for the family, they stepped up and began printing the fabrics with colorful patterns!



As this idea spread, publications popped up that showed specific patterns and interesting things that could be made with the fabric. Many of the manufacturers made the fabric so that the ink could be washed out with some vigorous washing, and they printed instructions for this right on the sacks.

As the Great Depression gave way to World War II, families extended out this commitment to ingenuity and thriftiness, and sack dresses became something not just for the impoverished families, but everyone.



Often, people could tell which children were related based purely on their outfits — as their clothes shared the same sack pattern. And it wasn't just children. Women made dresses for themselves out of the bags, as well. Some women even used their sewing skills to bring in some extra cash, sewing dresses and other items for friends and neighbors. And when the clothing finally wore out, it would be cut up and made into something else, like a quilt.

However, things changed with the onset of World War II. Cotton started being rationed to make uniforms for soldiers, and people were more than willing to give up the fabric in order to support the war effort. From then on, flour was packaged in paper bags — and it's been that way ever since. Who knew something as simple as flour could be so rich in American history!

drum or wheel.

- 1. See that front hub, inner and outer bearings are packed with grease.
- 2. Front hub washer should slide over threads on spindle body with fingers (loose fit).
- 3. Install nut and tighten it while slowly turning the brake drum so that all component parts are pulled together snugly; that is, inner and outer bearings will be snug in cones, washer is tight against outer roller bearing, and nut tight against washer. (There will be a slight drag when drum is turned.) Not over 8-10 ft-lbs of torque is required to get these results.
- 4. Turn nut BACK two castle slots (this is approximately ¼ turn of nut); insert cotter pin and try bearings for a slight side play and a free spinning

Don't forget the cotter pin! The nut will back out and the wheel will come off. That will totally spoil your Model A Day!
