SEPTEMBER TOUR





Cotter pins are the most basic parts on our Model A's

Of the hundreds of fasteners on our Model A's, cotter pins are among the most basic of all. They are nothing more than a short piece of wire formed into the shape of a pin.

Cotter pins are used throughout our Model A's – from the emergency brake handle, to the engine fan shaft to the front spring shackles. Depending on whom you ask, there are between 144 and 160 cotter pins in each of our Model A's in 11 different sizes, from $^{1}/_{16}$ by $\frac{1}{2}$ inch to $^{1}/_{8}$ by 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches. Cars built in 1928 and 1929 have a few more cotter pins than later models. Model T's are reported to have only 90 cotter pins.

Cotter pins, also sometimes called split pins, aren't replaced on a regular basis, so when working on your Model A you should always keep an eye open for broken pins. Also, always carry an assortment of pins with you when you are on the road.

The first patent for a cotter pin was granted in 1899 for a fastener that looks more like the end of a small dinner fork than a cotter pin. The bent-wire cotter pin as we know it appears to have been patented Feb. 15, 1916, and is credited to Allen Edward Ostrander of Ridgwood, N.J. Ostrander's patent was an improvement to the original cotter-pin designs.

Most cotter pins are made from mild steel or stainless steel. The latter can be beneficial on our Model A's since stainless steel doesn't rust. A cotter pin is designed to keep a fastener, such as a shaft or a nut, in place rather than acting as the primary fastener itself. For example, on our Model A's cotter pins are used to keep the castellated nuts on wheel hubs from spinning loose.

After inserting a cotter pin in an opening, the two prongs on the opposite side of the head of the pin are bent apart, locking the pin in place. When cotter pins are removed they should be discarded and replaced with new pins because bending and re-bending a pin quickly causes metal fatigue and leads to broken prongs.

There are many schools of thought concerning how to bend cotter-pin prongs and whether the prongs should be bent all the way backwards to wrap around the fastener that they are holding in place. Regardless of which method you use, avoid bends at sharp angles that can cause a prong to break, be sure

prongs (not just one) are bent, don't be afraid to cut off overly long ends, and tap the prongs lightly with a mallet into place on the head side and also on the prong side if you cannot bend the prongs carefully with pliers. Sometimes a blade screwdriver is useful to open a gap between the prongs.

Always us proper size cotter pins, which usually are the largest diameter that will fit in the hole. There's a cotter pin size and usage chart in the back of *Model A Ford Mechanics Handbook, Vol. 1*, by Les Andrews and a similar chart also can be found on the Mac's Auto Parts web site at this address:

One of the more infamous cotter pins in our Model A's doesn't actually hold anything in place. It hangs partially out of the hole on the bottom of the flywheel housing, where oil usually drips. In the early days of engine manufacturing, this "wiggle wire" was used to keep the hole from plugging up with sludge. As you drive, the cotter pin wiggles, keeping the hole open. Any oil leaking from the rear main drips down the cotter pin and out instead of fouling your clutch. — Neil Besougloff, club technical chairman

Memorial Day Overnighter Tour:

Our annual Memorial Day weekend tour was a cool and wet ride to Galena and back from May 25 to May 27, 2013.

We had to choose between sightseeing in Galena, Savanna, Dubuque, Chestnut Mountain or Stockton on Sunday but the drizzle did not bother anyone. We had fun anyway.

For some, the highlight of the trip was the bobsled ride down the ski slope at Chestnut Mountain to the river boat ride seeing many eagles and wildlife. Others commented on the rolling and winding rural roads they had never seen before. For others the decorations at the Iron Horse biker bar were entertaining as well as many antiques at the Pulford Opera House. The Mississippi River Museum seemed to draw the most people (it was warm and dry). For several it was winning at Diamond Joe's Casino in Dubuque.

For everyone it was a history lesson in the buildings dating back to the early 1800's at a time when Galena was the center of the advance to the West; a place where Presidents came to campaign as well as retire.

Steve Post, a local entertainer, sang us through the settlement of Galena on Saturday night. Whiskey drinking and pole men carried the earliest white settlers to the riches in the lead ore deposits; they pushed supplies and people up the river from Cincinnati traveling in keel boats. He covered driving out the Blackhawk and their anguish it caused. And the role of the great steam paddle wheelers that plied the river with goods, people and entertainment. How lead sulfide made one town the most powerful in Illinois for its moment in history. The river was originally the Fever River but at one point the locals decided a fever did not make the best press image so they changed the name to a symbol of wealth and opportunity, thus it became the Galena River.

Steve Repp, a local historian, who works in the "hysterical" section of the library (his words not mine) entertained comparing the sights of Galena 150 years ago in then and now slides. The Galena River was wide and deep enough to dock the largest 300' paddle wheel steamers. He called the town an "outdoor museum". The still elegant homes housed the powerful families of the day. The hillsides also housed the ambitious, the poor and frustrated. Steve was dubbed the puniest man to ever address our Model A club with puns. A fellow came into the Galena mining museum and looked down the mine shaft. At the bottom was a mannequin. He asked, "What do you get if you drop a piano down the shaft? " The answer --- an A flat miner. But his biggest blank laugh came from, "What do you do when you see a fork in the road?"

Wherever Europeans go, whisky, beer and churches follow. A Jamaican beer with its famous red stripe logo began in Galena. In the depression years of the thirties, an Englishman found Red Stripe to be a great beer so he bought the assets of the defunct brewery and moved them to Jamaica where they've had a long and prosperous life. Some enjoyed the beer and atmosphere of the Galena brewing company. *Continued on next page*
