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Eagle River Weekend Get-A-Way

New Updated Info-Can't miss event!!

Thursday, July 30 - Monday, August 3, 2020

Tour Group from Milwaukee area will be led by Dennis and Anne Wacker Tour Hosts in Eagle River are Carl and Charlene Wussow

This is truly a "can't miss" event. The ride will be long but so worth it. We are leaving on Thursday and heading back Monday to avoid the heavier weekend traffic and to allow a more leisurely route.

We have 15 confirmed rooms held at the **Eagle River Inn**, Eagle River, Wisconsin. It is a beautiful setting on Watersmeet Lake where the Eagle River and the Wisconsin River join on their journey to the Mississippi River. The complex is located on Hwy.70 West, just about a mile from the City of Eagle River. The parking lot is secure and away from other locations that would have had lots of traffic. Breakfast is included. Some items include: hot waffles, breakfast sandwiches, hard boiled eggs, oatmeal, Danish, cereal, coffee and other items.

Room Rates on the parking lot side, 2 queen beds, fridge and micro is on special for us at \$107.10 and a lakeside room, with patio doors opening directly to the water complex are \$125.10. None of the other hotels have settings like this one and others are in more crowded areas with much more vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

Hotel registration can be made by each family by calling the **Eagle River Inn: 715-479-2000**. They will need to identify themselves as part of the group from the <u>Wisconsin Chapter, Model A Ford Club</u> to get those special rates. I suggest that you make initial contact with the Eagle River Inn not much later than January as summer reservations will be increasing after that time. Early is always better than late!

Details are still being finalized for the weekend, but so far we will plan a Friday late-morning Pirates Hideaway cruise (Pirate attire is encouraged) and a Fish fry at Chef Rene's award winning restaurant at the Eagle River Inn (all you can eat for \$14) and they have a bar lounge adjacent to the restaurant.

Saturday is our weekend headliner event - <u>Three Lakes Petroleum Museum Car Show</u>: Arrive by 9:00 a.m. or before. The show is from 10:00 a.m. to 200 p.m. with awards following. The museum is free and open all day. Food is available on the grounds and each car registered early will receive a coupon for 1 sandwich (hamburger, cheeseburger, bratwurst or hotdog, chips, soda and popcorn. Over 250 vehicles will be on display.

The Three Lakes Winery is only 2 miles away from the car show and the wine selection is outstanding along with a related "wine related" gift shop.

Saturday night event will be movie and pizza night. We will be showing Public Enemies. It was filmed at Little Bohemia just a few years ago and starred Johnny Depp. It is accurate, exciting and will be an opportunity to prime us for our dinner at Little Bohemia the following night.

Sunday the group will depart the hotel at 1:30 for a drive through the beautiful forests in the area. We will stop at the Dillinger Museum for a tour and then enjoy dinner at Little Bohemia at 5:00 p.m. Since it has never been restored after the FBI and Dillinger gun battle, our cars will be a highlight for photographs in front of the main building. We will return the hotel before dark.

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

'A' Trip Back to June 1996


I don't know about Bob, but when it is my turn to write the Historical article for the Wheeling the A, I randomly grab one of the myriad of binders filled with past publications on the shelf in the basement, and open it to the corresponding publication month -- this one being June, 1996. In contrast to our June, 2020, that June was a flurry of activity. There was the Summer 'A' Olympics and a BIG Car Show/Swap Meet at State Fair Park: "No job is too small and larger jobs can be shared!" No less than 20 people volunteered to chair various components of that event.

Then there was a Rose Festival planned at Whitnall Park, planning for the 4th of July parades and the Rapids reunion, a need for new Tool Keeper, deaths noted, weddings celebrated, and new members added.

Contrast that with our situation today, when at the height of this COVID-19 pandemic, our Model A's are obliged to idling in the garage. Tours and summer activities are being cancelled and rescheduled. The big unknown is if the rescheduled activities will be able to be held.

While the Model A wasn't even a gleam in Henry's eye in 1918, this pandemic is often compared to that pandemic. That got me wondering how the Ford Motor Company dealt with 1918.

World War I was still raging until November 11th, and the pandemic was in full swing through most of that year. Ancestry.com writes that "in Detroit, over 1000 Ford Motor Company workers called in sick during March 1918." American Automobiles web site says that even though there were more than 2,250,000 Ford autos in service, the Ford Model T for 1918 was a continuation of the 1917 Mod-



el T. Perhaps with a war and a pandemic plaguing the country, the company decision was to just coast. The 1918 line up consisted of a Touring Car (cost \$360 and quipped with a four-cylinder water-cooled engine), Runabout, Sedan, Coupe, Town Car and a Delivery Car. An interesting note is that out of the 80,916 *chassis* that rolled off the line that year, 2,163 were for Military Ambulances. The pandemic raged into 1919. The current Waukesha Freeman indicated that the Milwaukee area suffered the most the four months from September through December of 1918.

Skipping back to June of 1996, the Ladies Page gave us recipes for Rhubarb Salad, Cherry Macaroon Cookies, and a Cool Whip Pie. The pie recipe was simple enough: into a Graham Cracker Pie Crust add in nuts, Cool Whip, Mandarin oranges, lemon juice and condensed milk. Sounds refreshing!

The 'A' Technical Tip was about timing gear covers. "If a manual spark advance distributor is being used the timing gear cover should be the original A-6019. *Continued on next page......*

If a centrifugal spark advance distributor is being used the timing gear cover should have the elongated boss with the timing pin hole located in the upper portion of the boss with a designated part number B-6019." (That is way out of my wheelhouse!)

Of course, as always, I love to share the Burma-Shave sign rhymes. This one was published in June 1996:

He saw -- The train -- And tried to duck it -- Kicked first the gas -- And then the bucket -- BURMA-SHAVE.
