

The FIRST Fords – Models K – S





Starting from 1903 with the Model A (shown above) founder Henry Ford and his team went through 19 letters of the alphabet before the Model T was introduced in 1908. Some of these cars were experimental or special models that never went into production. Ultimately 8 models reached production status before the Model T: the models A, B, C, F, K, N, R and S.

Last month we looked at models A - F. This month we are going to take a peek at models K - S.

1906 saw the introduction of what is considered Ford Motor Company's first failure: the **Model K**. This model sort of replaced the Model B and was aimed at the luxury end of the market. It boosted a new 6-cylinder engine that churned out 40 HP and the chassis had a 114 inch/290 cm wheelbase. It could be ordered with standard touring (seen here) or roadster bodywork.

So why was this Model K a failure? Apparently there were two reasons for that: the high price (\$2500 to \$3000 depending on trim level) and the lacking quality of the car. Also the fact that Ford had mainly concentrated on affordable cars since the start in 1903 and therefore had neglected to create a appealing image for its cars, wouldn't have



helped matters (something that remained a problem until the Lincoln marque was acquired in 1922). Still the Model K holds an important place in Ford history: it is believed to be the reason that Ford didn't produce 6-cylinder engined cars again until 1941 and it formed the catalyst in the process of Ford becoming a mass producer of cheap cars. As a result of the failure of the Model K, Alexander Malcomson, one of the founding partners of the Ford Motor Company and a champion of producing luxury cars, left the company. This gave Henry Ford the opportunity to become the major shareholder and president of the company in 1906, free to choose his own strategy.

Maybe the Model K was a failure, but this roadster version still makes a pretty picture. It was clearly aimed at the American sports car market.

The Model K was produced from 1906 till 1908, and 900 of them were made which makes "failure" kind of a relative verdict for this model. It was more so that sales didn't match up to the expectations rather than it was a poor seller.

This angle shows the odd third seat behind the front seats, a feature that more Ford roadster models showed in those years. Also notice the extremely long steering column protruding into the interior. That must have been a safety hazard, imagine what would happen to the chest of the driver of this car in a frontal collision...



Also in 1906 the new **Model N** was introduced, the car that replaced the Model A, C and F series. It was to become a big success, with 7000 of these cars built between 1906 and 1908. The Model N was small and nimble, easy to drive and affordable at a price of \$500, half of the price of the model F. Most Models N were sold with two-seater "runabout" bodywork, like you see on the picture. These cars had rudimentary fenders without splash aprons or running boards. Some Models N had special bodywork of varying types.

The Model N showed signs of the things to come and lead the way to the Model T. It was fitted with a 4-cylinder in-line unit that cranked out 15 HP, an engine much more modern than the old flat twin. The engine was placed in front and the rear wheels were driven by a shaft. Below the crank starter was the water pump in the radiator. Wheelbase of this model was the same 84 inches/213 cm as the old Model F.



The Model N was real basic transport, without much luxuries. Gas headlights and the convertible top were extras. But the car was rugged and practical and established Ford as a manufacturer of dependable, inexpensive cars for a broad market.

The **Model R** was an upgraded version of the popular Model N and had a short production run from April to October 1907. In this short time about 2500 of these cars were sold, enough to make you wonder why production stopped so soon. The Model R featured the chassis and engine from the Model N, but with minor adjustments. The body was a bit larger and had running boards and improved fenders. It sold at \$750, 50% more than the Model N. Apparently the added luxury was worth it.

The direct predecessor to the Model T was the **Model S**, again an adaptation of the Model N, which slotted in between the Model N and R. Most notable difference was the extra third seat behind the front bench that came as an option. This model sold for \$700 in its most basic form. The usual extras as gas lamps and a convertible top were supplemented by all kinds of other stuff ranging from fancy paint jobs to expressive horns and umbrella holders like you see on the car in this picture. Came in handy if you hadn't opted for the top and was surprised by a sudden shower while driving...

The bodywork of the Model S was more elaborate than that of the N or the R. It had a cowl-like cockpit where the N and R had just a wooden board and was fitted with improved fenders, complete with running boards and splash screens.

The model S was sold from 1907 till 1909, totaling some 3750 cars. Almost all of them were two or three seater runabouts.

it's amazing to see how fast the developments went from the first Model A in 1903 to this Model S five years later. 1908 also saw the introduction of the Model T, which was again a big step forward.

It must have been very exciting to be a pioneer in an era in which such big steps forward could be made in such a short time. Can you imagine that in 1913, only ten years after its humble beginnings, the Ford Motor Company produced half of all cars in the United States?



This month we feature 'CHICKEN BROCCOLI CASSEROLE' (Charlotte Kamholtz , from Wi Chapter, "A" Road to Good Cooking)

1 (8 oz.) pkg Stove Top stuffing 1 large pkg (20 oz.) frozen broccoli pieces 3-4 c. cooked chicken pieces 2 cans cream of chicken soup

1/2 c. mayonnaise1/2 tsp. lemon juice1/2 tsp. curry powdershredded cheddar cheese



Prepare stuffing as package directs. Cool. Cook broccoli as package directs. Cool. Lightly crease a 9×13 inch pan. Layer stuffing on bottom, then broccoli, then chicken.

Combine 2 cans of chicken soup, mayonnaise, lemon juice and curry powder. Spread this mixture on top of chicken layer. Sprinkle cheddar cheese on top and bake for 1 hour at 350 degrees.

Please remember we will be looking for a few new board members and an editor this fall so if your interested in helping to run your club let me know.



Jim's Tech Tips

"Check Your Rear Axle Nuts"

Every time I have a rear wheel off of a Model A, I use the opportunity to check the tightness of the rear axle nut for that wheel. They are supposed to be quite tight, and yet I find many with at least one axle nut that is loose. This is not good. If the hub is able to move on the axle, it will cause excess wear to the end of the axle and can damage it to the point where the axle will need to be replaced.



To check it, first remove the cotter key. With the transmission in 1st or Reverse gear, and the opposite rear tire on the ground, you can apply a wrench to the axle nut and confirm it is tight.

Ford did not publish torque values for nuts and bolts; he counted on the experience and "feel" of expert mechanics to know how tight to make things. Les Andrews has a value of 125 ft-lbs. in his book for this nut, and I feel that is a good target to shoot for. Watch the position of the cotter pin hole relative to the slots in the axle nut. If the pin will not line up on the nut, keep tightening the nut until the cotter pin goes in. Bend the ears over. I use a new cotter pin every time.

This simple maintenance step will help you avoid bigger problems down the road.


DID YOU KNOW?

*We are pleased to include another re-print of a "Did You Know" article from Al Lugo.

The Ford Motor Company has one of the richest histories of any Automobile Company. This was possible because of the preservation of documents, photos, and short films. It is my purpose in the coming months to bring you significant facts of Ford history presented in short "bullets". Please join me in honoring our rich Ford Motor Company History.

THE FORD ROTUNDA



- The Ford Rotunda was built in 1934 for the World Fair in Chicago. It was also referred to as the Ford Pavilion and was built as the Century of Progress exhibition. It housed installations depicting man's development in transportation. This exhibits was seen by more than 12 million visitors.
- The building was 900 feet long with a 12 story glass rotunda at its center. Since the emphasis was on the automobile, part of the tour of the Rotunda took place in automatically operated Ford Convertibles that rode in a special roadway. Many of the exhibits were designed by Walt Disney.
- After the World's fair it was moved to Dearborne and re-opened in 1935 as a visitor's gateway for
 people coming for a tour of the Rouge Factory. Inside of the Rotunda you could find murals showing
 the Rouge assembly line.

- At one point, it was the fifth most popular tourist destination in the U.S. in the mid-twentieth century. To give you an idea of its popularity this structure received more visits in the 1950s than did the stature of liberty.
- Some of the Rides or exhibits included the Magic Skyway which took guests seated in convertibles for a
 ride through plastic tunnels around the outside of the Rotunda.
- Also included the City of Tomorrow which was a futuristic city. Another exhibit was the Hall of Science
 which highlighted the Philco and Ford research projects. The Ford World was a 20 foot diameter
 rotating globe that highlighted the Ford Motor Company's operations around the world. The Drama of
 Transportation was a collection of vehicles arranged in chronologically order starting with an Egyptian
 chariot, horse drawn carriages and then the latest automobiles of the day.
- During World War II due to gas rationing the Rotunda was closed to the public serving as office space for the Army Air Corps. There was a theatre inside the Rotunda that was used to entertain the soldiers. In 1946 Henry Ford II met with ten young Army officers that were later known as the Whiz Kids.
- On June 16,1953 the Rotunda was reopened to the public as part of Ford's 50th Anniversary celebration. It included 50 huge birthday candles mounted along the rim of the Rotunda.
- Since the Rotunda was so popular it was used by Ford Motor Company to introduced new Ford Models to include photographs. They also held special events at this great facility.
- In 1953 the annual Christmas Fantasy was held for the first time. It included a 37 foot tall Christmas
 tree. It also included a great Santa's workshop and a life size nativity scene that was considered to be
 one of the largest and finest in the U.S.
- One of the vehicles introduced at the Rotunda was the 1958 Ford Edsel and the 1958 Ford Continental.
- The Ford Rotunda was destroyed on Friday, November 9, 1962, due to a fire. Shortly after 1PM a fire began on the roof of the Rotunda. The fire started when workers were waterproofing the building in preparation for the year's Winter Spectacular.
- Total damage was over 15 million dollars, the equivalent to more than 115 million dollars today. Also
 destroyed in the fire each of the 1963 Ford models which were on display. Also destroyed were several
 dream cars and 250 thousand dollars of Christmas decorations.
- Saved during the fire were the Ford Archives which survived due to a special carbon dioxide fire
 protection system. A year later these archives were donated to the Edison Institute known today as
 The Henry Ford museum.

 Recently the Early Ford V-8 Foundation and Museum restored the Rotunda sign. They are also currently planning a free standing structure as part of their Museum in the shape of the Ford Rotunda. The early Ford V-8 museum can be found in Auburn, Indiana.
