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

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


Sunshine Report:

OIL FILTERS

What Works and What Doesn't

There are currently three different aftermarket oil filters being made for the Model A. During the Model A era (1928 to 1931) there were over 20 different oil filters advertised for the Model A and sold through Ford Service garages, Western Auto, and other parts outlets. Many of the aftermarket oil filters were made and distributed by Stewart-Warner, AC Spark Plug Company, and Dunn Manufacturing using the Simplex Oil Filter.

The question has been asked many times if we thought these oil filters made today really work and how efficiently. We purchased all three of the oil filters that are currently listed in the Model A catalogs, and put them through the test.

Before describing the operating characteristics of these filters, it's important that the operation of the Model A oiling system is understood.


Model A Oiling System

The oil pump is located beneath the oil pan tray and is normally fully submerged in oil. The pump draws oil from the crankcase and forces it up through the pump housing, surrounding the pump shaft, to the valve chamber. A large 3/8" diameter tube, cast into the valve chamber, delivers the oil from the pump shaft to the valve chamber.

The oil pump delivers one gallon and one pint of oil per minute (at 1300 rpm) to the valve chamber. Consequently, it delivers more oil than is needed to the chamber. The excess oil flows from the valve chamber through overflow openings at each end of the

chamber to troughs in the oil pan tray below. Overflow oil at the rear of the valve chamber flows into the oil return pipe, located on the outside of the block. A full volume of oil to the crankcase circulates through this overflow pipe once every minute at normal car speeds and provides an effective method of cooling the oil before delivering it back to the oil pan tray. The excess oil then over flows the tray and returns to the bottom of the oil pan.

The gear type oil pump can develope from 80 to 100 pounds of actual pressure. Because of the large oil tubes and passages, oil pressure (as we know it today) is not developed in the system, except for the 2 or 3 pounds required to push the oil into the valve chamber.



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A Ford Able Full Flow Oil Filter




Figure 1 - A Ford Able Oil Filter

This oil filter kit (Fig. 1) is sold by Snyders Antique Auto Parts, Brattons Antique Auto Parts, and other Model A parts suppliers.




Figure 2 - Valve Chamber Oil Tube

A short piece of pre-formed steel tubing is supplied in the kit. One end of the tubing slips into the end of the 3/8" oil line in the bottom of the valve chamber (Figure 2). The threaded fitting on the other end attaches to the new valve cover (cast aluminum) and allows the full flow of oil from the pump to be pumped through the valve chamber oil tube, into the filter. The output of the filter runs directly back into the valve chamber. This is truly a "full flow" oil filter system, as all of the oil from the pump is directed

though the oil filter before being dumped into the valve chamber.

The kit includes a new (aluminum) valve timing cover, fully machined with a filter mounting pad, a Ford FL-1A filter element, formed steel tubing with brass fittings, and

valve cover gasket. The filter element mounts in a horizontal position and is easy to change. Before changing the filter, the car should sit for 30 minutes to allow most of the oil to drain from the element can.

This kit sells for about \$143.00. The *Model A Times* has found this to be an excellent choice for a Model A oil filter, as it effectively filters at least 90 % of the oil in the system before the oil gets to the valve chamber.

Timing Gear Cover Oil Filter




Figure 3 - Timing Gear Cover Oil Filter




Figure 4 - Taylor Oil Filter Oil Line

This oil filter kit is sold by Snyder's Antique Auto Parts, MAC's Antique Auto Parts, and other Model A parts suppliers. A new side timing gear cover (cast aluminum by TAYLOR) is made with a machined mounting pad for the filter element (Figure 3). This oil filter system is plumbed with a pre-formed piece of copper tubing with brass fittings that connect to the oil pump plug hole on the lower right side of the block (see Figure 3). The other end of the copper tube connects to the new timing gear side cover, just behind the filter element machined pad (see Figure 4). This directs the oil into the filter through a small 9/64 inch hole. The oil is returned from the filter onto the timing gear.

Keep in mind that the original oil path from the pump to the 3/8" tube in the valve chamber has been unaltered, allowing a full flow of oil into the valve chamber. The larger 3/8" oil line in the valve chamber will continue to pump oil from the oil pump to the valve chamber,

rather than taking the restricted path from the pump plug hole, through the small 9/64" input hole to the filter, and another restriction to pass through the filter. The flow of oil from the pump will take the path of least resistance, which is through the 3/8" tube in the valve chamber. It appears that only a very small amount of oil would ever pass through this oil filter.

This kit sells for about \$70.00. The Model A Times has found this to be an ineffective oil filter for the Model A.

Among frequently asked oil filter questions: Do I need an oil filter? Will an oil filter do any good? Which oil filter should I get?

Model A Times provided the answers to these and other questions about oil filters. This article originally was printed in Volume One, Issue Three, July, 2005.

The Fall Tour



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THIS MONTH IS FORD HISTORY: November 1, 1927 Ford Model A production begins

For the first time since the Model T was introduced in 1908, the Ford Motor Company began production on a significantly redesigned automobile on this day--the Model A. The hugely successful Model T revolutionized the automobile industry, and over 15,000,000 copies of the "Tin Lizzie" were sold in its 19 years of production. By 1927, the popularity of the outdated Model T was rapidly waning. Improved, but basically unchanged for its two-decade reign, it was losing ground to the more stylish and powerful motor cars offered by Ford's competitors. In May of 1927, Ford plants across the country closed, and the company began an intensive development of the more refined and modern Model A. The vastly improved Model A had elegant Lincoln-like styling on a smaller scale, and used a capable 200.5 cubic-inch four-cylinder engine that produced 40hp. With prices starting at \$460, nearly 5,000,000 Model As, in several body styles and a variety of colors, rolled onto to America's highways before production ended in early 1932.

November 15, 1977 The 100,000,000th U.S.-built Ford

On this day, at the Mahwah plant in New York, workers completed the 100,000,000th Ford to be built in America: a 1978 Ford Fairmont four-door sedan. The Fairmont series was introduced at the beginning of the 1978 model year, to replace the discontinued Ford Maverick.
