


Christmas Parade Drivers needed



Easy magnetic reflectors for safer night driving

Here's an easy way to add reflectors to the rear of your Model A without altering the look of your car.

These reflectors, unlike the common circular reflectors that must be screwed to bumpers, are temporary and attach with magnets. They are made from 3-M brand reflectors and flexible sheet magnets.

The photo shows one of my two reflectors attached to the back of my car. During daylight I store the magnetic reflectors underneath my dashboard (being magnetic, they simply stick to the underside of the gas tank). At night, I peel the magnetic reflectors off the gas tank and place them on the back of the car. Once I get home, the magnetic reflectors go back under the gas tank.

There are only two parts needed to make these reflectors, both of which are sold at hardware stores.



The reflective strips are attached to magnets.

First, buy a flexible magnetic sheet. I found mine in the nuts and bolts aisle of a True Value store. These are just like thin flexible refrigerator magnets, only instead of one 2-by-3 inch magnet, you are buying a larger sheet. The sheet I purchased came in a roll and was about 12 by 12 inches when unrolled.

The second part is the reflector. I purchased a white/red strip-style self-adhesive reflector, which is made of a flexible, mylar-like plastic. These reflectors are sold for trucks and trailers and I found them in the auto parts aisle of the hardware store. Mine was four sections long, so I cut it into two white/red pieces.

The idea is to affix the reflector to the non-magnetic side of the sheet, and then place the magnetic sheet onto your car. I used utility scissors to cut the magnetic sheet into strips about the size of the two reflector pieces. I peeled the backing paper from the reflectors and stuck them to the magnets.

The reflectors are flexible and can curve around the back of your car. They weigh next to nothing, so the thin magnetic sheet is more than strong enough to keep them on the back of your car as you drive.

Now, when driving at night, I have a little more piece of mind that the back of my Model A is more visible than with its taillights alone. – *Neil Besougloff, technical meet*

Thanksgiving Trivia:

By the fall of 1621 only half of the pilgrims, who had sailed on the Mayflower, survived. The survivors, thankful to be alive, decided to give a thanksgiving feast. The first Thanksgiving celebration lasted three days.


When the Pilgrims arrived in North America, the clothing of the Native Americans was made of animal skins (mainly deer skin).

A three-day feast with about 50 colonists and 90 Native Americans, the first Thanksgiving in 1621 didn't include mashed potatoes, pumpkin pie or cranberries. Deer, rabbit and squash graced the table, and historians believe that lobster, seal and swan may have been served as well. While fowl was on the menu, the bird of choice was probably not turkey.

Abraham Lincoln issued a 'Thanksgiving Proclamation' on October 3rd. 1863 and officially set aside the last Thursday of November as the national day for Thanksgiving. Whereas earlier the presidents used to make an annual proclamation to specify the day when Thanksgiving was to be held.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt restored the last Thursday of November as Thanksgiving Day in the year 1939. He did so to make the Christmas shopping season longer and thus stimulate the economy of the state.

Reminiscing with the Historian



On September 29, 1990, the 315 members of the Dallas Model A Ford Club, a region of MARC and a chapter of MAFCA, celebrated the club's 30th anniversary in a very special way utilizing 291 Model "A" Ford cars to spell "D-A-L-L-A-S M-O-D-E-L A F-O-R-D C-L-U-B" and have it photographed from the air. After taking the photograph, 613 Dallas Model A Club family members were treated to a full-scale Texas barbeque and were serenaded by the Irving Community Concert Band under direction of the retired director of the Coast Guard Academy Band.

This unusual way of celebrating the Dallas Club's 30th anniversary arose from what has become known as the "Texas Challenge." In 1984, a Santa Clara Valley, California Chapter of MAFCA set a record by having 72 club Model "A's" at a single event and issued a challenge to all other 260 MAF-CA chapters to try and beat it. The Wisconsin Chapter (the largest MAFCA chapter with 408 members from all over the state of Wisconsin and parts of Michigan) immediately gathered 104 cars and claimed the title only to find that on the very next weekend the Fort Worth, Texas Chapter had amassed 124 of their club's cars at a function in downtown Fort Worth. The "Challenge" spread to other parts of the country and the Colorado Chapter assembled 135 cars which was soon bettered by the Evergreen (Washington) Chapter's 142. Again, on the very NEXT DAY, Fort Worth gathered 147 cars to reclaim the title. Wisconsin began a full-scale

assault on what they dubbed the "Texas Challenge" and widely publicised the fact that they were going to "beat those Texas guys once and for all." Their "Stomp the Texas Challenge" slogan became a rallying cry. The full scale assault by Wisconsin and their widely publicised effort to kick Texan's spare tire produced a new record of 254 Model "A's"—a record they felt would probably never be broken...in fact, the Milwaukee County Executive issued a proclamation stating that Texas was the home of a *mere* 147 Model "A's" and the Milwaukee County, with 254 Model "A's" was, in fact, the Model "A" Capital of the World.

The adage says records are made to be broken. The Dallas Model A Ford Club, with its 291 Model "A's" attending this 30th anniversary picnic, had Dallas Mayor Annette Strauss issue a proclamation making September 29, 1990 "Dallas Model "A" Ford Club Day" in Dallas, Texas. The event was well documented with Dallas/Fort Worth's NBC television affiliate circling overhead in a helicopter shooting video footage which was shown that evening on the 10:00 p.m. newscast.

This photograph of the World Record number of Model "A" Fords attending a single event from a single club has been submitted to the *Guinness Book of World Records* and is currently in London for consideration for possible inclusion in their next edition.





THE SEPTEMBER TOUR REALLY "GOT INTO THE SPIRITS OF IT ALL"

On a sunny, but cool, early fall day, thirty souls in nine Model A's, a 1934 Ford coupe, a 1946 Ford sedan and a sprinkling of more "modern" cars wound their way down to The Great Lakes Distillery located near the Harley-Davidson Museum in Milwaukee.

There, we were greeted by the founder of the company, Mr. Guy Rehorst. After a few minutes of browsing in the gift shop and bar area becoming familiar with the products for sale; various spirits, T-shirts, glassware, etc., we moved to the distilling process section of the building. Here, one of the staff reviewed some of the history of distilling. Currently, this is the only distillery in Milwaukee, but we were all surprised to learn that there are ten others throughout the state.

The guide then took us through the steps of how the various spirits are produced; e.g., Absinthe, Artisan Series Brandy (clear, colorless), Rehorst Gin, Pumpkin Seasonal Spirit (distilled from Mil-waukee's Lakefront Brewery pumpkin flavored beer), Roaring Dan's Rum (Dan Seavey was the only man ever arrested for piracy on the Great Lakes in 1908.), Rehorst Vodka, Rehorst Citrus and Honey Vodka and Kinnickinnic Whiskey (blended with true Kentucky Straight Bourbon).

After he was finished with his presentation, we moved to the "tasting area" where we were able to sample each of the six various spirits. As you can imagine, everyone agreed to disagree on their choices of which one was "the best". At this point, photos were taken of Mr. Rehorst accepting a Wisconsin Chapter Certificate of Appreciation from Dave Boucher and Bob Davisson.

Next, we went back to the gift shop and bar area to make our purchases. Everyone then fired up the A's and we all headed out National Avenue to Callanan's Parkway Pub in West Allis for snacks and liquid refreshments. And a good time was had by all......

Roosevelt shooting re-enactment from JSOnline

Teddy Roosevelt took a .38caliber bullet to the chest Sunday in a striking re-enactment of the Oct. 14, 1912, assassination attempt in Milwaukee on the life of the then-former president and Bull Moose Party candidate for president.

Staged in period costumes by historical re-enactors at the downtown location where the real Roosevelt was wounded, the drama unfolded once again. Scott Paulson played the part of TR with relish. Smiling and greeting a small crowd, he exited the east entrance of the Hyatt Regency

Milwaukee hotel with a "Hotel Gilpatrick" banner put up to remind onlookers of what stood there a century ago.

Only a dozen or so others were dressed in period clothing, including several police officers in the long navy blue coats and hats that now seem oversize and women in long dresses and elaborate hats.

Still, the sound of a stage pistol fired by re-enactor playing would-be assassin John Schrank at Paulson was jolting. The fake Roosevelt staggered a bit from where he was standing in an open car as smoke from the shot hung briefly in the air, then quickly assured the crowd he was fine.

"He just pinked me," the candidate said.

"Don't strike the poor creature," faux Roosevelt said, as the shooter was wrestled to the ground then brought face-toface with Roosevelt. Then Roosevelt was whisked away for the short drive to the Milwaukee Theatre - in 1912 it was the Milwaukee Auditorium - for a speech that lasted 60 to 80 minutes, according to the presentation by Historic Milwaukee.

Roosevelt didn't realize he'd been hit at first and would later find that his folded 50-page speech, an eyeglass case and his thick wool coat slowed the bullet. It still pierced Roosevelt's chest muscle and cracked a rib before stopping, just before it could puncture a lung.

The Roosevelt re-enactor shed his topcoat and opened his suit coat to display to the crowd blood from his wound on his white shirt and his bloodied speech copy.

"It takes more than that to kill a Bull Moose," the Roosevelt re-enactor said in an abbreviated version of the address given 100 years earlier. He professed to have no concern about his own death. "I am very much uninterested in whether I am shot or not."

Roosevelt spoke of his Progressive Movement, extolling the right of laborers to organize and blasting the Democratic and Republican parties of the day as reactionary. He made a special plea to residents of Wisconsin, birthplace of the Progressive movement, to back him and take the effort national.

Roosevelt was treated later at a Milwaukee hospital, then taken by slow train to a Chicago hospital, where he spent a week convalescing. The bullet was never removed. By JSOnline
