



10-24 years Black Badge 40-49 Years Red Badge


25-34 Years Silver Badge 50 Years Gold Badge



Board of Directors Meeting Minutes – August 13, 2011



All board members present

President – Mike Quam – The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm. Nothing to report.

Vice President – Dave Boucher – It was reported we received six new member applications this month bringing our membership to 277. It was mentioned that we have numerous out of town members, some who do participate in our events. A motion was made by Mike Y. to approve the new members and was seconded by Gene T. Motion voted on and approved.

Secretary – Dave Huenink – Dave asked for any changes or corrections to the minutes from the last meeting. A motion was made by Mike Y. and seconded by Paul P. to approve the minutes. Voted on and approved as read. We receive reciprocal newsletters from other Model A clubs. We also received some correspondence from someone running for the MAFCA board of directors. The South Milwaukee Heritage Days group sent us a thank you note for participating in the event along with a \$50.00 check. The date for this event next year is July 28th 2012.

Treasurers report – Paul Piotrowski – Paul reviewed the treasurers report. The motion was made by Gene T. and seconded by Neil B. to accept our treasurer's report. Voted on and approved. Sunshine and awards turned in a bill for \$42.37 for cards and a donation in honor of a former club member who passed away. Mike Q. turned in a bill for \$45.98 for editor's expenses. A motion was made by Mike Y. and seconded by Dave B. to approve the bills. Voted on and approved. Income: \$100 for participating in the Franklin 4th of July parade.

Outdoor – Gene Taurman - Luther Manor sent us a flier regarding their event a September 10^{th} . A mass mailer will be sent out to the club membership to inform them of this event. The tentative schedule of club events was presented for 2012. It was review and discussed with the board. It was decided to keep 2 outdoor tours in September and 2 in October. The signup sheet will be at the club picnic. We were reminded that anyone who attends the National convention in Marquette, Michigan next year needs to be national member. Paul P. mentioned he will not be the host for the Greendale 4^{th} of July Parade in 2012.

Indoor – Mike Yokofich –The Christmas party in December is set up. Mike talked to Dan Gus' wife regarding a contract for using the hall. Mike is hoping to get a contract finalized soon. No one has signed up to be the chairperson for the banquet in January 2012.

Club accessories – Mike Clinnin – Some more club car banners have been sold. Paul P. brought up the member year buttons and mentioned there is a machine available for \$400+ so we could make our own buttons. The group decided not to purchase a machine at this time. Dave B. brought up the idea of getting window stickers for the Model A's saying we belong to MAFCA – Wisconsin Chapter. There will be more discussion at an upcoming meeting.

Awards and Sunshine – Steve Lewis – Member John Gregorski passed away. Joyce Churchill had shoulder surgery. A thank you note was received from the Rohdes family. It was decided when a club member dies a mass email will be sent to the membership. This information should be passed on to the club secretary for email distribution.

Old business – We discussed ideas of a raffle gift for the 2012 MAFCA national meet. Nothing was decided as of yet. The ideas included: gift certificates from Home Depot, Usingers, Klements, or exquisite chocolates from a shop in Cedarburg. More thought will be given to this. The swap meet disc still is not on file. The judging standard books were not ordered, because we didn't meet the minimum order at the shipping discount price and now the shipping discount date has passed. Thought is being given for our annual cash donation to a charitable organization. More discussion at an upcoming meeting. Nominations for the new incoming board members will be starting next month.

New Business – Carl Doro's letter was brought up. There were several topics the board reviewed. The forum on the club web site was discussed and it was decided not to pursue it. We looked at possibly going on to Facebook. One of the concerns was who was going to monitor the content. Also, it was brought up about a flip page on the web site. Reminiscing with the Historian

A pair of well-known long-time members were featured in an article appearing in the Menomonee Falls local newspaper on September 29, 1983. Due to length, it has been excerpted here.

"They Auto be in Pictures"

On a perfect late summer's evening Dan Kane and Ed Schultz decided to take a leisurely drive around Menomonee Falls. From Ben Franklin to Kohl's they were met with stares, widening into smiles, small children grinning toothy grins and pointing excitedly and adults passing in their race to wherever to smile and wave.

They weren't driving any young whippersnappers, instead their vehicles were more like Menomonee Falls circa 1929. Dan's yet-to-be fully restored vehicle was a 1931 Delux Tudor complete with hand crank, running boards and a shiny quail ornament. Ed's car was a basic black 1929 Town Sedan, the Cadillac of its day, elegant down to the last window shade.

Windows rolled down (that means the windshield too), the men cruised through the village, sitting high above the other cars, enjoying the ride and the reaction these vintage cars bring. Both looked contented as they easily steered their cars past the police station, up Menomonee Ave., toward Ed's home. "It's a different feeling because you're noticed by everybody," Ed beams. "You can't help but be on an ego trip but that's not the reason I drive it. I drive just for the enjoyment." *Continued on next page*

Their interest in Model A's and involvement in the club dates back 10 years for both men. Dan had always been a car fancier, owning a 1937 Lincoln and a '41 DeSoto "I still drive."

He says, "I used to drag race and I love cars. I always played around with cars," and one day decided to seek a family-oriented car interest, one his wife and now three young children, could enjoy too."

Next step was his purchase of a '29 Roadster pickup truck, and the '31 Tudor. "This is one of the last Model A's made," he explained. He's rebuilt the engine and put on a top roof, but much work remains.

That's a huge part of the enjoyment, the men said, restoring the vintage cars to their original elegance from the frame through the upholstery, attention to detail is critical.

Ed's second Model A, the sedan holds a soft spot in Ed's heart because "This car my dad had in 1932. I always thought I'd like to have a car like that," and he does now.

His first purchase of the Coupe was for his two sons, Paul and Mike, Ed says. At a car show 10 years ago his sons spotted the antique cars and kept telling dad how great it would be to have one.

"So good old Dad forked out the money," Ed chuckles and soon found himself involved in a fascinating hobby and a member of a club he can't praise highly enough.

Part of the allure of the cars is the club itself, the men said. Dan, 37, a sales correspondent for Harnischfeger Corp., said the fun of driving them with others of the same interest was a major draw.

Over and over he and Ed, 46, a Milwaukee mailman, talked about the camaraderie of the club, all the family-oriented activities including picnics and parties, and the tours, which everyone from babies on up attend. "You're enjoying the sights and you enjoy the ride," Ed says. "Everybody can enjoy it, not just the car buffs."

Ed is currently vice president and has been club accessory sales chairman and national correspondent. Dan, formerly treasurer and president is now technical meet chairman.

From Nashville to Dallas, Seattle to Reno, and Minneapolis to Washington, D.C., the club members have attended national meets. Ed packed his two sons in the rumble seat (Okay, except when it rained, son Paul grinned) and drove his Coupe to Nashville in 1976.

All along the route they were met with happy faces and loads of questions, he said. And that's the best part. "Everybody's your friend."


LOOKING BACK IN THE REARVIEW MIRROR......

1915 Rules for Teachers

- 1. You will not marry during the term of your contract,
- 2. You are not to keep company with men.
- 3. You must be home between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6a,m. unless attending a school function.
- 4. You may not loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
- 5. You may not travel beyond the city limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.
- 6. You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.
- 7. You may not smoke cigarettes.
- 8. You may not dress in bright colors.
- 9. You may under no circumstances dye your hair.
- 10. You must wear at least two petticoats.
- 11. Your dresses must not be any shorter than two inches above the ankle.
- 12. To keep the school room neat and clean, you must: sweep the floor at least once daily, scrub the floor at least once a week with hot, soapy water, clean the blackboards at least once a day, and start the fire at 7a.m., so the room will be warm by 8 a.m.
